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Course Description and Objectives

Pre-requisite: LIS 501, 505, 511, 605 or consent of practicum advisor. Provides students with practical experience in a real-world library to apply skills and knowledge learned in the classroom.

Course objectives are for students to:

- Gain hands-on experience working in a library environment
- Demonstrate how LIS theory is related to practice
- Use journaling and PowerPoint to document and communicate the practicum experience
