Course Description: An introduction to reference materials, services, activities, and functions as well as methods for locating information.

Required Text and Readings: The following text will be required:

Other readings will be required for class and are listed under the weekly modules. The readings will be made available full-text or can be accessed through the University databases.

Goals: To introduce students to the basic reference sources and services found in libraries and information centers and acquaints them with the history and philosophies of reference resources and services.

Objectives: Upon successful completion of this course, students will demonstrate a basic knowledge of:

- 1. The wide array of print and online reference resources available
- 2. The concepts, principles, and techniques of reference and user services that provide access to relevant and accurate recorded knowledge and information to individuals of all ages and groups including but not limited to the reference interview, reader's advisory, and user instruction
- 3. The factors used in the selection and de-selection of print and online reference sources.
- 4. User's privacy, freedom to read and intellectual freedom
- 5. Information literacy
- 6. The differences between user groups and methods of advocacy used to reach specific audiences to promote and explain concepts and services.
- 7. The principles of assessment and response to diversity in user needs, user communities, and user preferences in relation to the reference collection (what's being used, what's not being used how can you tell?).
- 8. New technologies and their impact on reference, including the delivery of/evaluation of reference and the instructional methods employed in today's libraries or information agencies.

Technology Competencies: Students will use email, word processing, web searching, database searching, interactive courseware (including discussion boards and digital dropbox), virtual classrooms, and webpage creation as regular components of the course. Students must have access to a computer that allows them to participate in the virtual classroom.

Teaching Techniques/Methods Used: Instructional methods may include, but are not limited

to, virtual lectures, online quizzes, e-mail, discussion boards, database searching, and Internet searching.

Class Policies: The online nature of this course demands that you do a lot of reading and participation. Be prepared to read thoroughly so that your knowledge shines through in class discussions.

This course consists of several different components that you must be aware of and understand:

• PARTICPATION

- Participation in weekly class sessions and discussion board activities is required. You MUST attend class each week and you should check multiple times throughout the week for updates, emails, announcements, etc.
- Your grade will be determined by 1) logging in; and 2) active participation. If you have more than two absences, you will automatically fail the course.
- Exceptions will only be made under extraordinary circumstances (documentation will be required). Let me know before class if you cannot attend. Even if you have permission to miss, you will miss partial participation points on weeks where group sharing is required.

• ASSIGNMENTS

- All assignments should be turned in by 11:59 pm (CST) on the day it is due unless otherwise indicated. If you have a serious illness or some other extenuating circumstances, please contact me before it is due so that we can talk about any adjustments that need to be made.
- Even with prior arrangements, points may be deducted for late assignments or assignments submitted incorrectly.

• COMMUNICATING WITH ME

• You can send me email anytime, and I will generally respond by the next morning (except weekends).

- It is required that you email me using USM email (<u>rachel.mcmullen@usm.edu</u>) or through the course shell in Canvas.
- Please put the course number (LIS 401) in the subject line and include your last name. Also remember to sign the email.

• HOW I WILL COMMUNICATE WITH YOU

- I will use either our course messaging system or announcements to provide important information and updates about the course.
- To contact you directly, I will use the USM email account to send messages. You MUST have access to this account and check it regularly.
- If you overlook an important message, you will still be held accountable for the information provided.

• INCOMPLETE COURSE GRADE

- A final course grade of Incomplete (I) is given only if extraordinary circumstances beyond the control of the student prevents completion of coursework. Documentation will be required.
- A grade of incomplete can only be removed by completing all required coursework by the end of the following semester (excluding Summer) or the grade automatically changes to F, however the instructor can require that work be submitted at an earlier date. A grade of I will not be given unless the majority of work for the semester has been completed.
- Students receiving an I cannot receive an A at the conclusion of the course.

• DISCUSSION BOARDS

- Most weeks we will have a discussion board, which will be a place for communication with your peers. I will read it but will participate minimally—I will not comment on each entry. In order to receive full credit, post at least three times (your original post and at least two responses). Answer the questions, referring to the readings or other materials that you have located (be sure to give a complete citation if you refer to outside readings, though you are not required to use outside sources).
- Your answers should be substantial; they should meet the minimum listed word/sentence length. Writing doesn't need not be in a formal, third person style but you should check your grammar and spelling before posting and avoid texting abbreviations (e.gf. IMO, OMG, etc.).
- Please do not post unsubstantial comments like "I agree"— this will not count for credit.

Academic Honesty/Plagiarism: Plagiarism is serious. You must give credit for five or more words in a sequence by using quotation marks and indicating the source of the quote, and you must indicate the source of other factual information and ideas. Copying another student's work in part or whole is also plagiarism. Plagiarism in an assignment will result in a failing grade for the assignment.

The following is from the USM Bulletin:

Plagiarism is scholarly theft, and it is defined as the unacknowledged use of secondary sources. More specifically, any written or oral presentation in which the writer or speaker does not distinguish clearly between original and borrowed material constitutes plagiarism.

Because students, as scholars, must make frequent use of the concepts and facts developed by other scholars, plagiarism is not the mere use of another's facts and ideas. However, it is plagiarism when students present the work of other scholars as if it were their own work.

Plagiarism is committed in a number of ways: 1) reproducing another author's writing as if it were one's own; 2) paraphrasing another author's work without citing the original; 3) borrowing from another author's ideas, even though those ideas are reworded, without giving credit; [and] 4) copying another author's organization without giving credit.

Plagiarism is a serious offense. an act of plagiarism may lead to a failing grade on the paper and in the course, as well as sanctions that may be imposed by the student judicial system.

Engaging in any of these behaviors or supporting others who do so will result in academic penalties and/or other sanctions. If a faculty member determines that a student has violated our Academic Integrity Policy, sanctions ranging from resubmission of work to course failure may occur, including the possibility of receiving a grade of "XF" for the course, which will be on the student's transcript with the notation "Failure due to academic misconduct." Note that repeated acts of academic misconduct will lead to expulsion from the University.
